### 1. Opening of the 2017 Annual General Meeting

#### **Meeting called to order – 19:37 hrs**

The meeting was chaired by Mr. Tony Ziukas, (PCASA) President.

Olav Kappert made a motion to open the AGM. The motion was seconded by Marie Maguigad. It was unanimous.

The annual report for 2017 was distributed to all present.

### 2. Review and Approval of the Agenda for the 2017 Annual General Meeting

A Motion to approve the agenda was made by Nick von Roretz and it was seconded by Derek Kopke.

The agenda was unanimously approved.

### 3. Review and Approval of the Minutes for the 2016 Annual General Meeting

The minutes of the 2016 Annual General Meeting (AGM) were reviewed.

Olav Kappert made a motion to approve the minutes from the 2016 AGM and this motion was seconded by Nick von Roretz.

The minutes were unanimously approved.



#### 4. Correspondence

There was no new correspondence to report.

5. Executive Members' Reports – only President, VP Finance and VP Technical will present their reports.

#### President's Report:

2017 was a great year due to the opening of the Terra Cotta chalet with its excellent dressing rooms.

The MU21AAA team won the league and the playoffs!

The club membership is stable in terms of numbers.

More technical coordinators have been hired to work with teams at the intercity level.

The club volunteers put out a great effort this year.

The club coach program has been growing steadily.

PCASA will continue with the 4 to 64 soccer program which promotes soccer for all ages.

The Pointe Claire club has a strong presence in the Lac St-Louis region.

Among the challenges facing the club is communicating with members. Also recruiting volunteers is an ongoing challenge.

Goals for next year:

- Improved use of technical resources.
- Better success for house league teams.
- Improvement of the club structure.
- Better communication for club members.

T. Ziukas expressed thanks to the club staff, the City of Pointe Claire including Steve Garwood and Vicky Barnes, the Mayor and Councillors. Thanks as well to sponsors, including Michelin.

Finally, thanks most of all to all the volunteers who contributed to the club's success.

Questions and comments from the floor:

Q: How many members are there?

A: There are 2106 members this year.



Q: Would it be possible to put the minutes of the executive meetings on the PCASA website?

A: The minutes of executive meetings will be posted after approval by the Executive at the following meeting.

Q: (C. Buchanan) Can you expand on the restructuring?

A: The intent is to reduce the role of the executives and have more duties done by the directors.

Q: Why was a women's Metro team folded during the outdoor season with what seemed to be little input from the VP of Metro?

A: T. Ziukas explained the reasons for the folding this team which included a lack of registered players. It was noted from the floor that a very limited time was given to save the team.

Q: A concern was raised about decisions for VPs being done by others?

A: T. Ziukas explained further the decisions concerning the folding the women's Metro team.

Q: Why not merge with Dorval?

A: It was looked at in 2010 as well as more recently. There was little response from Dorval. The city of Pointe Claire also has input on any merger as they give the club a lot of support. S. Garwood also noted this point.

Q: (M. Maguigad) What happened to the 2 other Metro teams that are not with the club?

A: One team didn't come from another club as expected, and the second team left for Dorval.

Comment: The price structure is hurting the Champagne league as they lost 20% of its members last year.

Reply: T. Ziukas took note of this issue.

### Financial Report:

The club lost \$70 000 this season and these are among the reasons:

- Revenues were down 6% due to 100 fewer players and there were fewer players registering late with added fees.
- Equipment and technical costs increased a lot more than expected.
- There were some additional costs due to the move into the new chalet.

The good news is that \$20 000 of sponsorship money is available.

The largest challenge will be equipment and inventory management in the upcoming year. There were late invoices for equipment. There is not a robust inventory system in place. There was a problem in tracking inventory during the move. There is now an excess in inventory.



We have had stable pricing over the last 4-5 years. There will have to be an increase in fees at most levels.

Questions and comments from the floor:

Q: (O. Kappert) Why don't the financial reports go on the website?

A: Any club member can ask to see them. For now, they are not on the website.

Q: What is the status of the camera?

A: It is being tested.

Q: Why the long delay?

A: T. Ziukas explained the reasons.

Q: Can the city pay for delays incurred in the chalet completion?

A: (L. Kattackal) The club cannot go after the city for this given their already substantial financial support.

Q: Is there a finance committee?

A: Yes. L. Kattackal named the members.

Q: Was there a tender for the camera?

A: No, the camera was chosen based on performance and criteria.

Q: Why are there paid club coaches?

A: L. Kattackal explained in detail the rationale for this program.

Q: How are club coaches chosen?

A: M. Sadi explained the criteria for choosing club coaches.

C: One member said that the program was good in past years but this year the technical support was poor.

Q: Are other sponsorships being pursued?

A: There are rules imposed by the city that limit sponsorships.

Q: Are surveys of club members ever considered?

A: It is very difficult for a volunteer-based club to do such surveys.

Q: Are grant applications being considered?

A: There is a lack of resources to prepare grant applications.

Q: Does PCASA present a financial report to the city?

A: Yes.



Q: Why did the House League Tournament cost more given that there were food trucks?

A: Costs were higher than expected so food trucks probably won't be done this way again.

### Technical Report:

M. Sadi explained the three summer programs and the two winter programs.

- Futsal has been very successful
- The Boys' Academy was very good, less so for the Girls' Academy.
- Almost all intercity clubs practise in the winter.

The evaluation of House League players has been done since 2012. Also, we now provide technical support for house league teams.

Five of the A level teams did very well.

We now have 40 club coaches, and they are all certified by the Region.

The Region is now stricter on certification of intercity coaches than it used to be. The Region offers a program of coordinators to help the intercity coaches.

Goalkeepers' clinics are now being offered in both the summer and winter programs.

More field rentals are needed in winter now.

### Challenges

- To increase the number of girls in intercity and in micro levels.
- To have more coaches for the girls' teams.

### Questions and comments from the floor:

Q: How many volunteers are there this year compared to previous years?

A: M. Sadi replied that he didn't know, he then explained how club coaches work.

C: A 50% participation rate in winter practises is required to get on an inter-city team.

Q: Can there be individual evaluations for all players?

A: The individual evaluations only start at U8 based on the available resources. There are evaluations done in October and in March.

Q: What are the wages paid to club coaches and intercity coaches?

A: M. Sadi explained the reasons for the present pay-scale for these coaches.

C: There is a concern about the competitive level of the girls' intercity clubs.

R: M. Sadi indicated that it is challenging to compete against the larger clubs at this level.



Q: Almost all U9 girls come from 2 of the 5 schools in Pointe Claire. Can the club approach the other schools?

A: No this is not possible however M. Sadi explained what else could be done.

## Sporting Director - Report

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I would like to take the opportunity to first thank the coaches for their dedication to each of their teams. They are the most important components that enable our programs to develop and that allow our players to have a positive experience with our club. Thanks!

The year 2018 was a transition year for the technical team and the club. We officially started our work in January 2018 with the introduction of a new technical structure, more developed than before. The primary objective was to better take charge of our competitive teams and a more thorough follow up of all our programs, from Micro to House League. Our first task was to better allocate our winter 2017/2018 fields, because they had been incoherently planned by the previous people in charge. Our second task was to implement the Club Technical College (CTC), which is an exchange platform for the club's coaches; it was a first for the club and much needed to ensure structured development and support for our coaches which trickles down to our players. To this day, we have organized 3 CTCs, and a 4th one is scheduled in November. Then came the planning of the spring evaluation sessions, which enabled us to finalize, in collaboration with the coaches, the squads for our 24 U09 to U18 intercity teams. The day-to-day activities of the club and the implementation of our different programs was done through 16 technical committee meetings over the season, including 8 between January and March to ensure the most efficient transition as possible, which allowed us to have a close follow-up and set the bases for the season to come and the following ones. Simultaneously, we developed a Player Development Plan (PDJ/PDP) that serves as a base for our work and encompasses player and coach development. The season was also a success in terms of budget, with expenses just below the parameters set by the Executive Committee.

### Micro

At the Micro level, our focus was on 2 main elements: a binder with exercises and our club coaches. First, we decided to offer the technical program drills for Micro printed in binders so that all micro coaches could use them in their on-field sessions. 70 binders were produced this year. This tool has proved very practical and easy to use. Then, we have



been able to count on 30 club coaches to help our micro players with the volunteer coaches. Some of them were able to complete their S2 and S3 courses in order to deepen their knowledge as coaches. We also consolidated our U08 Development program that prepares our groups for the intercity level. Both the boys and girls groups showed a nice progression and they will be more ready than ever to start their competitive adventure in 2019.

## **House League**

At the House League level, we focused on 3 elements: participation in the evaluation sessions, technical sessions and respond to specific needs over the season. At the evaluation sessions, the sporting director and certain club coaches took charge of groups to allow the teams' coaches to observe the players and select balanced teams. I followed up with the organization of 4 technical sessions in the month of June, for MU09/10 and FU09/10 players. Participation was good and response from the players to these sessions has been very positive. We also answered specific needs over the summer to what was presented to us by the VP House League, which we were in constant communication with. Finally, we have been able to better define our winter programs for 2018/2019, with the appropriate format of play for futsal (5v5) and more game-oriented sessions.

## **Intercity**

In Intercity, we were able to line up 24 teams from U09 to U18, which is one more than 2017. We are still dependant, in certain age groups, to the total number of players in the category, which explains a varying number of teams depending on the age. In general, the team results improved compared to the previous years. In all categories, teams were able to consolidate their place. With younger groups (U09 and U10), the teams were better prepared, more organized and more structured, which was reflected in their continuous development this season. In 9 versus 9, the main challenge was the number of players and the growth of the squads to allow them to enter 11 v 11 with enough players. With the older groups, we have seen that teams have been able to develop an identity and are now able to identify their main areas of work to progress in years to come.

We were also able, through our technical structure, to ensure follow-ups of all of our groups until U16, because we have someone in charge of U09-U12 and of U13-U16, on top of our technical team members that were assigned to specific teams.

Notable results are to be highlighted here: Our F09A D2 team had an exceptional season, crowned by a victory in a D1 tournament, our M12A team finished in first place and won a



tournament, and our M16AA team won their age group's Cup in their first year at the AA level.

## **Coaches Development**

This year was very positive in terms of coach development. Many candidates furthered their knowledge of the game by completing their S2, S3 and S7 courses in order to be better equipped to organize positive training sessions focused on player development. Some of our coaches also took part in more advanced courses on the Development and Performance pathway: one coach successfully passed his License C course, and another one completed the first part of the course in 2018. Furthermore, two of our Assistant Sporting Directors completed the theoretical portion of the License B1 (provincial) and our Sporting Director completed the theoretical portion of the License B2 (national). These trainings will enable our team to learn new elements of the game that will be useful in the setup of the programs as well as with the mentorship that we do with our coaches. On top of that, we have introduced the CTC this year, which is necessary to ensure a useful exchange of information between the technical team and the coaches and vice versa. We are also very satisfied that 96% of our intercity coaches were trained according to the FSQ and ARS Lac St. Louis rules, a 18% increase from 2017.

## **Challenges and objectives for 2019.**

For 2019, we are facing certain challenges, out of which the main one is the membership: we have to ensure we have enough players to continue with our groups, and to remediate this, we have to better identify the players that can integrate higher level teams, something which we've already started. We also have many areas of work that are identified. In Micro, we want to improve the way we support our volunteer coaches and club coaches by offering practical, on-field sessions and theory sessions in class. For House League, we have planned to determine the needs so that the programs have the most impact for player development and start planning them over the winter. In Intercity, we have planned to support our teams so that those that are ready to make the jump to AA are identified, supported, and stay at that level. We also want to increase our numbers at the younger age groups in order to develop a maximum of players in a positive

environment and to ensure enough players when the format of play increases. Finally, as far as coaches training goes, we want to continue on what was started in 2018 and offer internal training sessions like the CTC. It is also our objective to have more responsibilities given to



our team on that subject, by making them responsible for coaches training and mentorship of our clubs' coaches.

## Vice-President, House League - Report

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### Season summary

29 teams from U10 to U18:

- 6 M10, 5 M12 and 4 F14 teams playing in the Pointe-Claire House League
- 2 F10 teams joined the F10 Dorval-Lachine league
- 2 F12, 3 F16, 1 F18, 2 M14, 2 M16 and 2 M18 teams played in the recreational Lac St-Louis Youth Local League (Interclub)

### Highlights

**Practices at the beginning of the season for Interclub teams:** As the season starts earlier for teams playing in the Youth Local League, turf practice fields were reserved in May so that each team had at least 2 practices before their first game. Turf practices are in high demand at the beginning of the season since the grass fields usually only open after the long weekend in May, and it's important to ensure that House League teams also have reserved times.

**Technical team practices:** Players from the M10 and F10 teams were invited to 3 technical extra practices in June on Saturday mornings. The objectives were to help the coaches get new practice ideas and having a different practice experience for the players. Overall feedback was positive for these practices. Some players asked for more.

**Practices for F12/F14 divisions:** A coach volunteered to run joint division practices for the F12 and F14 players at the beginning of the seasons. The objectives were to improve skills and confidence for the players right at the beginning of the season as well as familiarize the F12 players with the F14 teams since many would be called up to play with them.

**All-Star teams:** 6 teams participated in the Lakeshore Soccerfest (M10, M12, F14, F16, M16 and M18). The M12 and M16 team won their divisions and the M18 made it to the finals.



**International Cup Kids playing for Kids:** 1 F14 team participated in this tournament where all proceeds are donated to Montreal's children's hospital (Ste-Justine, Children's and Shriners). The F14 team represented Croatia and won the gold medal.

**Soccer Pointe-Claire House League Tournament:** the tournament was competitive for the House League divisions, and the Interclub teams all had an exhibition game. The tournament committee worked with Hockey West Island and Ringette Pointe-Claire on the schedule and decreased many time conflicts (although it was not possible to eliminate all conflicts).

**Lac St-Louis Regional Tournament:** The Pointe-Claire teams, M12 Celtics and F14 Cometes, each won the bronze medal in their respective divisions.

### **Plans for next year**

**Technical team practices:** Encourage more House League coaches to take the Quebec Soccer Federation courses (S2, S3 or S7) to have a better expertise. Have a local 3-hour session with all the other House League coaches to help them plan their practices and improve player skills and techniques. Continue to offer technical practices for F10 and M10 players on Saturday mornings.

## Vice-President, Micro - Report

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**U4;** This year Nick and I decided to continue to run the U4 program "Academy Style" (no teams) and to separate the boys and girls. Boys wore blue and girls red. We started the season with the boys and girls practicing at Valois Park, both at 6:30 – 7:20 on different fields. Unfortunately, low parent volunteers raised many safety concerns, as the ratio was one coach/adult to 8-10 kids. Nick, Amanda and I made the decision to have the boys and girls practice at different times. This allowed us to reduce the ratio to a 1:5 which helped with the safety of the players and improved their development. We will look at how to better manage the program and have it planned more efficiently for registration 2019. One change we are making is creating a more detailed plan for parents to read and take home with them during registration 2019.

**U5 – U6;** This year all U5 and U6 teams were assigned to play at Jubilee. This was the first year they were practicing there. We decided to make 10 teams of 6 -7 players to facilitate playing time for the players as last year we had received feedback that the teams were too big and the players weren't playing enough. This year we had some players with long vacations and therefore we had to merge teams at every practice which was not ideal but the best solution to the problem. We also had a lack of coaches on the boys side, resulting in teams having only 1 coach, or none at all. We will be looking at either going down to 8 teams (which would result in a bigger rosters), and/or finding a way to recruit more parent volunteers or placing more club coaches.

**U7 – U8;** U7 and U8 went very well this year with the 2017 evaluations that were done, as well as the May 2018 evaluations to form Div1 and Div2 teams. We could use more coaches/volunteers to facilitate the program, however overall the program doesn't need much change.

### **Ways we are looking to improve for 2019**

1) A Winter training course for club coaches (parent volunteers as well) on how to structure a practice, work with younger children and with parents (January-February in Lindsay Place Gym). The general feedback we received from parents and our club coaches was that they felt a little under prepared. Better preparation for the coaches will lead to better practices which will lead to better development for our micro players.



2) Reviewing the jersey sizing with our supplier, Evangelista, to ensure better fitting jerseys for all age groups. The main issue was that the jerseys were too small for the majority of the players and we were scrambling to rectify, unsuccessfully at times. Reviewing this will relieve much unneeded stress.

3) Recruiting more parent volunteer coaches and supporting them with technical club coaches. Across many of the Micro categories, we were lacking volunteers. Many times we didn't have enough to cover during vacations. We will be speaking with parents about volunteering during registration.

4) Forming the teams earlier if possible.

5) Improving the Technical Binder for simpler exercises at U5 and more challenging exercises for U8. General feed back regarding the binders was that they were ideal for U6 and U7 but too easy and hard for the U8 and U5 respectively. Nick, Fred and I will be looking to find more appropriate drills for the respective categories.
